- 6 College Success Centers launched across Newark by RU-N's Abbott Leadership Institute, serving 400 students since 2015
- 1,200 Newark students in Mayor's Summer Youth Employment Program
- City-wide college fair
- NCLC Leadership Institute monthly workshops on academic and soft skills

- 8-Week SAT prep course taken by 125 local students
- Monthly professional development for Newark guidance counselors at all 16 Newark Public Schools high schools
- Parent engagement & FAFSA completion
- 200 students annually in College Freshman Institute

Pathways to Achievement & Success

- Youth empowerment through creative place-making
- 3D design, photo portraiture, printmaking, theater, gallery curation, public speaking
- Goal mapping, SAT prep, college advising
- Initial cohort of 150 10th graders; 600 by year four



RU-N Talent & Opportunity Pathways RU-N to the TOP

- Newark residents with household adjusted gross income (AGI) is \$60,000 or less AND students transferring to RU-N with associate's degree from NJ county college, and whose household AGI is \$60,000 or less: scholarships covering 100% of undergraduate tuition & fees (after federal, state, and external scholarships have been awarded).
- All students admitted to RU-N's Honors Living-Learning Community (HLLC) receive 100% residential scholarships covering the full cost of room and board.

Impact to Date

- Undergraduate enrollment up 13.2% since 2013
- 825 RU-N to the TOP scholars in 2016-17
- Newark resident enrollment up 23% from 2015, 47% from 2013
- NJCC transfer enrollment up 21% since 2013
 - 43% of NJCC transfers are from Essex, Hudson & Passaic CCs

Honors Living-Learning Community

A state-of-the-art facility serving upwards of 500 first-and second-year students; dining, recreational, and academic space; curricular themes of "Local Citizenship in a Global World;" and increased enrollment of the talented students from Greater Newark, as they live and learn at RUN with students from all over the world.

HLLC Entering Class 2016

- 60 students; 38 first-year, 22 transfer
- 52% from Newark
- 86% students of color
- 47% first-generation college-going
- Includes students who are parents, formerly incarcerated, formerly homeless, formerly in foster care


